Rhetorical Critique—Questions That Might Be Addressed

- 1. How well does the text suit its particular audience and purpose?
- 2. How has the genre affected the author's style, structure, and use of evidence?
- 3. How do the author's language choices and sentence length and complexity contribute to the impact of the text?
- 4. How well has the author created a reasonable, logically structured argument?
- 5. How reputable, relevant, current, sufficient, and representative is the evidence?
- 6. How well does the author persuade readers that he or she is knowledgeable, reliable, credible, and trustworthy?
- 7. How well does the writer appeal to readers' emotions, sympathies, and values?
- 8. How much does the author's angle of vision or interpretive filter dominate the text, influencing what is emphasized or omitted?

Ideas Critique—Questions That Might Be Addressed

- 1. Where do I agree with the author?
- 2. What new insights has this text given me?
- 3. Where do I disagree with the author?
- 4. What points has the author overlooked or omitted?
- 5. What new questions or problems has the text raised?
- 6. What are the limitations or consequences of this text?

Reflection—Questions That Might Be Addressed

- 1. What personal memories or experiences does this text trigger?
- 2. What personal values or beliefs does this text reinforce or challenge?
- 3. What questions, dilemmas, or problems does this text raise for me?
- 4. What new insights, ideas, or thoughts of my own have been stimulated by this text?
